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Introduction

Cultural heritage refers to the tangible and intangible traditions, practices, artefacts, and other cultural expressions that are passed down from one generation to the next within a community or society. It can include things like historic buildings and monuments, art and literature, traditional music and dance, and customs and practices associated with different holidays and events. It also includes intangible elements like oral history, traditional knowledge, and skills. Cultural heritage can be an important source of identity, community cohesion, and social continuity. It is also a valuable resource for education and tourism. Cultural heritage binds Europe together through our common history and values and can be a powerful tool for empowering adult and young people. Cultural heritage can serve as a vector of openness and tolerance by promoting understanding and appreciation of different cultures and traditions. It can also serve as a tool for promoting social cohesion and building bridges between different communities and generations. By highlighting shared cultural roots and values, cultural heritage can also help to combat prejudice and discrimination. However, it is important to note that cultural heritage can also be used to promote exclusion and reinforce power imbalances, if not managed and presented in a responsible and inclusive manner.

The aim of our project CivicHeritage is to empower vulnerable adults by promoting equal opportunities, civic participation, social and professional inclusion and access to training opportunities, especially for people with low qualifications and/or unemployed or in a vulnerable situation. To achieve these goals, the partners will provide training content and educational resources, tools and methodologies aimed at the target audience, **using cultural and natural heritage as the main medium**. The objectives of our project are as follows:

1. Promotion of local cultural and natural heritage by adults and their local communities
2. Promote innovative approaches based on the richness of cultural and natural heritage to educate and empower adults to actively participate in democratic life at local, national and European level.
3. Facilitate adults' access to education, work, entrepreneurship, social, and professional life by developing their skills: soft skills, self-confidence, problem solving, entrepreneurship, communication, intercultural skills, teamwork, Networking, ICT...

This project aims to offer a solution to adults with low competitiveness, facilitating their social, cultural and professional integration and increasing their participation in lifelong learning and democratic life.

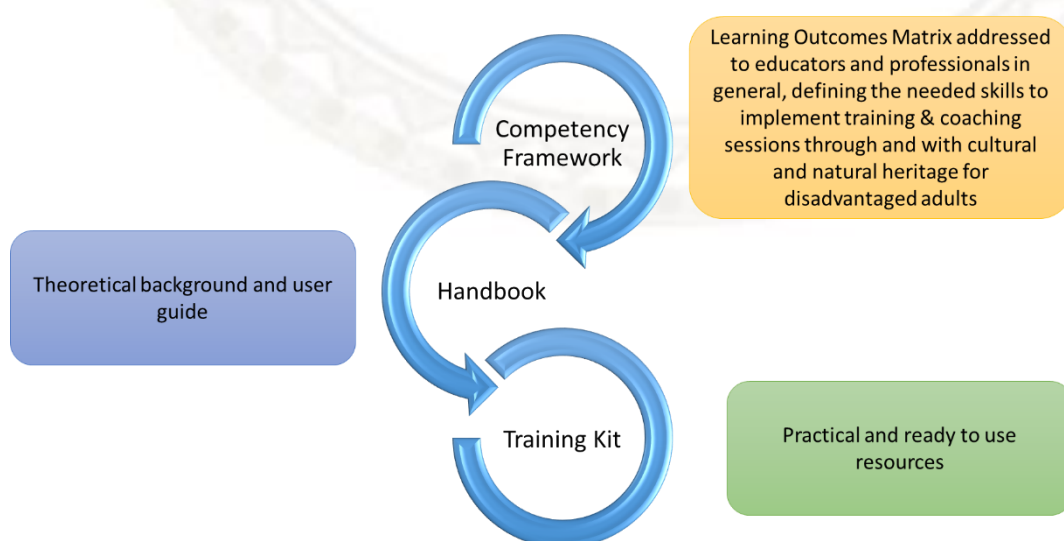
This Competency Framework serves as a guiding Framework developed within the framework of Work Package #2 – CivicHeritage Competency Framework. Its purpose is to support partners in developing content and providing readily usable tools (Handbook and Training kit) focusing on the following training needs:

1. Promoting culturally responsive pedagogies
2. Intergenerational transmission as form of education
3. Linking safeguarding of cultural and natural heritage to sustainable development while increasing learners' skills
4. Move from teaching about heritage to teaching through and with heritage
5. Integration of cultural and natural heritage in the training of disadvantaged adults to foster learners' knowledge of the rich European cultural and natural heritage

Meeting the above training needs will help to upskill our adult educators and professionals by proposing two resources informed and inspired by the Competency Framework, namely:

- A. A solid theoretical background about cultural and natural heritage with a focus on our regions; and how to use it as training context to train vulnerable adults. This handbook is addressed to educators and professionals focused on how to use cultural and natural heritage in training as a:
- Lens for studying historical, social and economic events
 - Resource to rediscover old vocational techniques and practices in different sectors (building, environment, food...)
 - Way to develop cross-cultural understanding and awareness (intercultural dialog and communication, discover different perspectives by stories, tales, legends, food, music and dance...)
 - Way to promote sustainable development and preservation of natural and cultural heritage
 - Efficient tool to empower disadvantaged adults.
- B. A practical and ready to use educational resources. This Training Programme for educators informed by the Competency Framework and backed by the theoretical Handbook will equip educators with the needed educational approaches and resources to train and coach disadvantaged adults. It comprises a set of practical activities, tools and methods based on the Common training methods with innovative practical tools to support educators in their training and coaching sessions. Informed by the Competency Framework above, the training kit will facilitate the capacity building of disadvantaged adults through and with cultural and natural heritage focusing on the following skills:
1. Sense of belonging, identity and engagement
 2. Creativity and eco-design
 3. Entrepreneurship (time management, planning, budgeting, marketing...)
 4. Intercultural and intergenerational communication
 5. Sustainability
 6. Networking
 7. Digital competencies

The representation of the three project results is articulated in the following scheme:



Overview of the Competence Matrix

Considering the aforementioned training needs and project objectives, the subsequent step involves developing the CivicHeritage Learning Outcomes Matrix (LOM) as a foundational measure to design and develop the CivicHeritage Handbook, the CivicHeritage training kit, and their corresponding content.

The structure of the LOM is organized around three components: Knowledge, Skills, and Attitudes.

- Knowledge encompasses the assimilation of information acquired through learning, comprising the body of facts, principles, theories, and practices pertinent to a particular field of work or study. Within the framework of the European Qualifications Framework (EQF), knowledge is defined as theoretical and/or factual understanding.
- Skills: Skills entail the capacity to apply knowledge and utilize know-how in accomplishing tasks and resolving problems. Within the EQF framework, skills are delineated as cognitive (utilization of logical, intuitive, and creative thinking) and/or practical and technical (manual dexterity and utilization of methods, materials, tools, and instruments).
- Attitudes: Attitudes encompass the capability to tackle tasks and resolve problems spanning various levels of complexity, alongside differing degrees of autonomy and responsibility.

Improving adult skills and civic engagement while valuing cultural and natural heritage

Objective: empower vulnerable adults by promoting equal opportunities, civic participation, social and professional inclusion and access to training opportunities using cultural and natural heritage as the main medium.

7. **Digital Competencies in Heritage:** Knowledge of digital tools and platforms relevant for documenting, preserving, and disseminating cultural and natural heritage.

3. **Community Engagement:** Ability to involve local communities in heritage preservation efforts, fostering a sense of belonging and ownership.
4. **Creativity and Innovation:** Skill in developing innovative approaches to heritage education, including eco-design principles and sustainable practices.
5. **Communication:** Effective communication skills for facilitating intercultural and intergenerational dialogue, utilizing storytelling, music, and other forms of cultural expression.
6. **Networking:** Ability to establish and maintain partnerships with relevant stakeholders, including heritage organizations, educational institutions, and community groups.
7. **Digital Literacy:** Proficiency in using digital tools for heritage documentation, research, and dissemination, enhancing accessibility and outreach.

3. **Adaptability:** Flexibility in responding to the diverse needs and backgrounds of learners and communities, adjusting educational approaches accordingly.
4. **Initiative:** Taking proactive steps to identify opportunities for heritage education and advocacy, contributing to the project's goals and objectives.
5. **Reflective Practice:** Engaging in reflective practice to continuously improve teaching methods and approaches based on feedback and self-evaluation.
6. **Autonomous Learning:** Encouraging learners to take ownership of their learning journey, providing resources and support for self-directed exploration of heritage topics.
7. **Leadership:** Demonstrating leadership qualities in guiding collaborative heritage projects, inspiring and empowering others to contribute to heritage preservation and education efforts.

The design and creation of both the Handbook and the training kit will be founded upon the aforementioned Learning Outcomes Matrix (LOM), further reinforced by a series of educational worksheets. These worksheets will serve as a guide, delineating potential content and tools necessary to fulfil the primary objectives of the CivicHeritage project, which are as follows:

1. Promotion of local cultural and natural heritage by adults and their local communities.
2. Promote innovative approaches based on the richness of cultural and natural heritage to educate and empower adults to actively participate in democratic life at local, national and European level.
3. Facilitate adults' access to education, work, entrepreneurship, social, and professional life by developing their skills: soft skills, self-confidence, problem solving, entrepreneurship, communication, intercultural skills, teamwork, Networking, ICT...

Educational worksheets

The aim of this educational worksheet is to deepen educators' comprehension of the importance of cultural and natural heritage within society, encompassing its historical, social, and economic dimensions. Additionally, it seeks to furnish educators with the requisite resources and strategies to seamlessly integrate this understanding into their teaching methodologies. These materials are devised to aid the partnership in crafting content and tools within Work Packages 2 and 3. However, they can also serve as direct sources of inspiration for educators in their day-to-day teaching efforts.

Suggestions for the Training Kit

To optimize its utility as a practical educational tool, it is advisable to structure it into two distinct yet interconnected components based on the present Proposition Value/Competency Framework:

1. The initial segment entails a comprehensive lesson plan delineating the specific objectives for each module.
2. The subsequent component encompasses an array of exercises, assignments, and hands-on activities tailored to reinforce the concepts covered in the lesson plan (at least two exercises, one practical activity, one method)

Lesson Plan can be structured as follows:

Learning Goals

Learning objectives are specific, measurable goals that outline what learners are expected to achieve by the end of a learning activity or course. They describe the desired outcomes of the learning process and provide a clear focus for instructional design and assessment. Learning objectives typically include observable actions or behaviours that demonstrate mastery of a skill, knowledge, or concept. They guide educators in designing instruction, selecting appropriate learning activities, and assessing student progress.

Overview

A synopsis of the subjects and engagements explored within the module, which will be thoroughly elaborated upon in part #2. Each lesson plan should encompass the following components:

1. An icebreaking activity intricately tied to the module's theme.
2. Incorporation of one pedagogical method aligned with the objectives of the learning unit/module. Refer to the pedagogical worksheets within the Competency Framework to select an appropriate method.
3. Integration of at least two exercises/assignments aimed at reinforcing comprehension and skill acquisition.
4. Inclusion of one practical activity to provide hands-on experience and real-world application of concepts covered.

Materials

A comprehensive list of materials or resources necessary for the lesson, including but not limited to maps, photographs of monuments, paper, pencils, projectors, computers with internet access, and any other relevant items essential for facilitating the learning experience.

Evaluation

Furnish an assessment tool designed to measure the extent to which the learning outcomes have been attained through the activity. This may include various methods such as multiple-choice questions, open-ended inquiries, performance tasks, or any other suitable evaluation technique.

Educational Worksheet #2: Pedagogical Approaches – Culturally responsive pedagogies
